PASTOR'S COLUMN

iGiveCatholic: iGiveCatholic is a new reality in the Catholic Church that tries to foster online giving on the traditional #GivingTuesday. #GivingTuesday is the Tuesday that follows Thanksgiving, Black Friday, and Cyber Monday. #iGiveCatholic is a Giving Day that kicks off the charitable season and brings the Catholic community together to give thanks and give back. It is the U.S. Catholic Church's Giving Day created to celebrate our unique Catholic heritage, "iGiveCatholic inspires faithful stewards to "Give Catholic" on #GivingTuesday, a global day of generosity.

The goal of #iGiveCatholic is to rally our Catholic community in support of our local parishes, schools, and ministries. Secure, tax-deductible donations to eligible Catholic organizations located in participating Dioceses are given at www.iGiveCatholic.org during a 24-hour period on #Giving Tuesday, December 1, and at any time during the Advanced Giving Day phase beginning at 12:00 AM on Monday, November 16 through 11:59 PM on Monday, November 30, 2020. Offline gifts of cash and checks are encouraged and given directly to the organization of the donor's choice during this same period.

ALL SOULS SERVICE: I want to thank our liturgy committee for finding a way to put on the All Souls Service this year under difficult circumstances. Every year we need to remember those who have passed away, but this year more than other years. It has been difficult at times to gather people together even in times of grief because of the pandemic. Special thanks to Lori Vasconi for keeping track of all the information and contacts that are need for this service, to Jeff Trimble for printing our beautiful programs, and Joe McLaughlin for putting together our slide show and lighting. Thanks to Jeff Trimble and Mary Messina for providing our music and Sue McLaughlin for presenting the names at the service. Thanks to all the liturgy committee members who helped with various aspects of the service. Your kindness and generosity are a real service to our parish and in particular to our members who are grieving.

ST. ROSE AND ST. MARY CEMETERY COLLECTION: During the month of November it is traditional for us to remember those who have died from our families and our parishes. As we remember and honor the goodness of their lives, it is important for us to honor their place of rest in our parish cemeteries. **To help us maintain the proper care for these cemeteries we are having a Cemetery Collection on the weekend of November 1, 2020.** An envelope for this Cemetery Collection is in the bulletin this weekend and at all the entrances. All donations to this collection will help to pay for grass cutting and care at our parish cemetery throughout the year. The care and maintenance of our parish cemeteries requires the generosity of our entire parish family. Thank you for your faithful stewardship to our parish cemeteries.

COVID-19 CHRISTMAS: Our celebration of Christmas Masses will most likely not be any different than our Masses now. The obligation to attend Mass on that day will be removed. We will also have to wear masks and keep socially distant from each other. It will also mean limitations on the numbers of those who will be permitted at each Mass – that number will be 200 people. **A letter will be coming to you later this month that will outline our procedures for Christmas.** Christmas Masses will be Christmas Eve at 4:30, 7:00, and 9:00pm and Mass on Christmas Day will be at 9:30am. In order to limit the number of people at each Mass you will be asked to call the parish office to make a reservation for the Mass you wish to attend. The reservation process will begin on a certain date in December and promptly conclude on December 22 at 4:30pm. Once that number reaches 200 the Mass will be considered full and people will need to consider a different Mass to attend. Also know that we will provide an online Mass as we have been doing since Easter. This might be a better option for people as the Mass can be viewed at a time that is convenient for you and your family.

COVID-19 GUIDELINES: Please do not become lax with the guidelines for being in church during this pandemic. We are all tired of doing things differently and being inconvenienced but we need to be vigilant to protect one another, particularly those who are most vulnerable. And that includes most of us, and even me, your priest. All the guidelines are listed below but here a few that have been neglected lately:

- 1. MASKS/FACE COVERINGS:** Masks must be worn at all times when you are in the Church and should cover **both your mouth and your nose.** Please keep your mask on when coming to communion. Once you have received the host in your hand, then you can pull the mask down momentarily to receive communion. The mask should then cover your mouth and nose again.
- 2. FRONT ROWS:** If you have difficult walking please sit in the front rows where you can be seated during the whole Mass and I will bring you communion right at your place.
- 3. COMMUNION STATIONS:** No matter which section you sit in, you must follow the directions for receiving communion. If you go in the wrong direction, you put other people at risk.
- 4. NO OBLIGATION:** remember the obligation to attend Mass has been removed during the pandemic. If you have difficulty attending Mass or are not feeling well, please stay home and watch Mass on TV or on the internet.
- 5. LEAVE WHEN MASS IS OVER:** Please leave the church immediately after Mass. People should not be staying in church to light candles or to talk to other people – this puts people at risk. You can talk outside if you wish. **We need this time after Mass to clean and sanitize the church.**

6. **RECEIVING COMMUNION:** I have said this from the pulpit and written it in the bulletin and even said it to people as they come up to communion: PLEASE KEEP YOUR HAND FLAT TO RECEIVE COMMUNION (This includes your thumb!). Your other hand should be UNDERNEATH YOUR FLAT HAND. If you are right-handed, your left hand should be on top and FLAT and your right hand should be UNDERNEATH your left hand. Some people are doing this correctly, but some people are still not keeping their hand flat and are reaching for the host before I can pull my hand away and thus touching me. You should not be reaching for the host until you have stepped to the side and are ready to consume the host. Please be attentive to this.

IF YOU HAVE NOT BEEN TO MASS IN THE LAST FEW MONTHS, YOU NEED TO READ THROUGH THESE GUIDELINES AND FOLLOW THEM CAREFULLY TO PROTECT OTHER PEOPLE.

NOT A RETURN TO NORMAL: We have been open for a few weeks for daily and weekend Masses, **but this is not a return to normal.**

Bishop Persico has given us permission to begin public Masses, **if people follow the protocols that have been put in place.** Those protocols can be viewed on the diocesan website www.eriercd.org and our parish website <http://www.stjosephs-sharon.org/> The dispensation from the obligation to attend Sunday Mass and Holyday Mass is still in effect. Those who are ill or who are at risk should remain at home and continue to use the television or internet Masses that continue to be made available.

- Confessions are being heard on Saturday from 4:00 to 4:30. Because of the restrictions of COVID 19 we are not able to use the confessionals. Confessions are in the main body of the church in front of the confessional, masks are required, and six feet of distance needs to be maintained between the priest and the person confessing. People are asked to sit in the section near the organ to wait for confession. **Because of this the church is not available for others to come and pray at this time to give privacy to those wishing to go to confession. Please do not enter the church for Mass until 4:45pm or until the doors are propped open.**
- The doors for Masses on the weekend are propped open so you do not have to touch the doors. **The doors are opened one half hour before Masses.** We have not returned to normal. Please plan to arrive in that half hour before Mass starts.
- **GENERAL RULES FOR MASS: Masks are to be worn by everyone.** Social distancing – six feet apart – must always be maintained – even when in line for communion and when entering and leaving the church. Families in the same household may sit together. Pews will be taped off to indicate where you can and cannot sit. Hand sanitizer is available at each entrance and you are encouraged to bring your own in preparation for communion. We are only permitted to use 1/3 of the church capacity. There will be no collection basket passed, but there will be baskets at the front of church to put your envelopes in either before or after mass. Communion is strongly encouraged to be received in the hand. People should come to Church and find a place to sit and not gather to talk. After Mass people should leave in an orderly fashion keeping the appropriate distance from each other. People should go immediately to their cars and leave and not gather in groups that will block exits and cause people to come into close contact. Please avoid contact with surfaces. Doors and pews will be sanitized after each mass.
- I realize these are an inconvenience to everyone, but we need to be very diligent about protecting others. Think of others first.

LATEST INFORMATION: The best place to find the latest information is our parish APP or the parish website. You can connect this App to your phone by texting APP to 88202. This App is FREE. This was something the diocese paid to let all parishes and parishioners stay connected about two years ago. Some people, including me, have experienced the Sunday readings not being up to date. The best fix seems to be to uninstall the App and reinstall it.

REFLECTION ON THE READINGS: These last few weeks of the Church year focus us on the end of time or the second coming of Jesus.

The Gospel readings for the next few weeks will come from a section of Matthew's Gospel that addresses concerns about the end of time and the second coming of Jesus. The heart of these parables, remember they are parables and not exact descriptions of events, is that God will raise the dead and the living to eternal life in heaven but we do not know the day or the hour when this will occur.

Paul deals with this question in the second reading speaking about how those who are alive at the coming of Jesus will not have an advantage over those who have died. We will all be raised up to the glory of heaven by our loving God. The details of this event – no one knows.

The first reading is from the book of Wisdom. We all know people who are very intelligent but may not be wise. Wisdom is much different than knowledge. This book personifies Wisdom as a woman and invites us to look for her as she waits at our door for us to partake of her wisdom. God will give wisdom to those who genuinely seek it.

Child Protection and Creating Safe Environments - Bullying Prevention Month:

Relational bullying is unwarranted, persistent, unwelcome behavior in the form of criticism, isolation, or fabricated allegations that can damage relationships. Examples include social exclusion (“You can’t be with us”), spreading rumors (“Did you hear...?”), and withholding friendship (“I won’t be your friend if you...”). Though relational bullying can often seem ambiguous to outside observers and often garners less attention than physical bullying or verbal bullying, it should not be discounted simply as normal, adolescent behavior. In fact, several recent studies suggest relational bullying is more strongly related to emotional distress and teen depression than any other form of bullying.
